Donny Digits: Heroes! Heists! Hot Dogs! by Woodrow Phoenix



Join your hosts, Adam and Lisa Murphy, as they get the answers to many questions, on Corpse Talk, the show that brings the dead famous to life!








Mexikid by Pedro Martin

She really just wants to fit in and find a true friend, someone who appreciates her, Phonic Ear and all. Finally, she is able to harness the power of the Phonic Ear and become 'El Deafo, Listener for All.' And more importantly, declare a place for herself in the world and find the friend she's longed for.



The Arrival by Shaun Tan

The Arrival is a wordless graphic-novel that tells the tale of an immigrant father who leaves his family in an unsafe place to work in a foreign land. He tries to find a place to live, a job and a handle on a new language. It depicts the hardships and challenges that immigrants experience when moving to a new country with a reunited family at the end looking to a hopeful future.



White Bird by R.J.Palacio

Julian is best-known as Auggie Pullman's classroom bully. White Bird reveals a new side to Julian's story, as he discovers the moving and powerful tale of his grandmother, who was hidden from the Nazis as a young Jewish girl in occupied France during the Second World War.





Amulet by Kazu Kibushi
















Hilda and the Troll by Luke Pearson
